FROM THE PASTOR

We use measurements in nearly every area of life to gauge our health. Our weight – measured in pounds – may suggest that a diet is in order. Our temperature – in degrees Fahrenheit – may warn us that there is an infection raging in our body. Our blood pressure – measured in millimeters of Mercury (mm Hg) – can serve as a warning that we may be at high risk for a stroke. Our eyesight – gauged by the clarity or sharpness of our vision at a distance of 20 feet – will tell us not only whether we need corrective lens but also the strength needed. And diabetics will test their blood sugar (glucose) levels multiple times daily, measuring their levels in milligrams per deciliter.

In much the same way that we ought to be monitoring most of these physical measurements and levels, so too do the Scriptures urge us to monitor our spiritual health. “Test yourselves,” Paul exhorts, “to see if you are in the faith.” (2 Corinthians 13:5).

Rev. Larry Davies is the District Superintendent of the Lynchburg District of the UMC in Lynchburg, VA. He writes a blog entitled “Sowing Seeds of Faith” that I read from time to time. Last spring he posted a list of ten ways that we might likewise measure and gauge our faith. I emailed him and he gave us permission to reprint his column in our newsletter. These are his suggestions, from a post entitled *Ten Questions of Faith and Ministry*.

Do I pray regularly? It sounds so simple yet nothing happens without prayer. When I am struggling it is often because my prayer life is not what it should be. Does your church emphasize prayer as a regular and critical part of their ministry? Prayer is always step one.

Do you have a vision? It is difficult to shoot an arrow if there is no target. So how can you function without a vision from God and goals to help you fulfill the vision? What talents and resources are available to you... to your church? What is needed in your community?

Are we growing in faith? Spiritual formation is a continuous journey of learning, experiencing and sharing the Word of God. Young and old are discovering a passion for God’s Word but don’t always know where to begin. Bible studies and small groups play a key role in spiritual development. Take a class, participate in Sunday school or join a prayer group.

Pastor's Letter, continued

Are you caring for others? What are you doing to maintain loving contact with friends and family? Do you regularly offer encouragement? What is your church doing to care for each other? Most offer shepherd groups, support ministries or prayer chains. Perhaps you can help. The simple gesture of sending a card is a ministry that often works miracles.

Do you cultivate friendships beyond your own comfortable group? If you don't... why not? Maybe you need to get a life! Just kidding but it's important that you reach beyond your comfort level and seek to understand other age groups and cultures. You will learn a lot and enjoy an exciting new experience. Young and old, Spanish or Korean, black or white alike have so much to offer but all need our love and respect.

Am I involved in a community ministry? Is there a Habitat for Humanity near by? Am I doing anything for children at Christmas? Are groups fixing broken down houses for people too poor or sickly to make their own repairs? Is there a "Meals on Wheels?" Every community has needs? To meet those needs God has given us all unique talents. What am I doing with mine? It's usually not that hard to discover what's needed and ask: "How can I help?"

Are you a witness? Do people really know what you believe? How can you talk about God without others feeling intimidated or offended? Do coworkers look upon you as someone they can trust? Will you listen to their concerns with respect and love? Are you praying for opportunities to share your faith? My favorite definition for witness: "is the willingness to make a sincere and honest attempt to be a friend in the name of God."

What about men? 61% of those not attending church are men. The most successful ministries that reach men are: mission trips, building projects and sports. Many men that participate in these ministries become more involved with their church.

Are we reaching single adults? More than 56% of the unchurched population is single. Surveys indicate that many single adults believe in God but feel isolated from the church. We can start recognizing their needs by changing our language. Family night supper implies that you must be married to attend. Instead call it a "Fellowship and Fun" supper. Ministry ideas could include divorce and grief recovery workshops or single parent programs.

What about children? Parents are struggling to provide a wholesome environment for their children. How are you helping? It starts at Sunday school but there are other ideas such as: After-School Ministry, Parent's Day Out or M.O.P.S. (Mothers of Pre-Schoolers)

Davies Ten Questions likely don't fit our area perfectly, but they come close enough. So how are you doing? As you read his ideas, where are you feeling challenged to grow and step out in faith? And perhaps most importantly, what will you **do** about what you've learned?

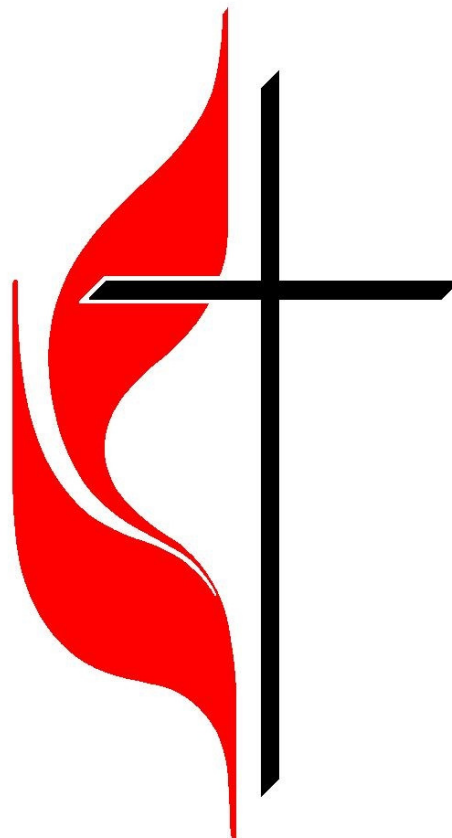

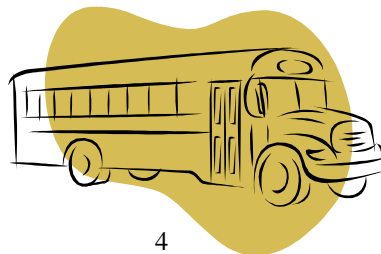
8th ANNUAL “BACK TO SCHOOL KICK-OFF” SCHOOL SUPPLY DISTRIBUTION

BETH'S MESSAGE

On Being a Witness

My maternal grandmother became blind due to complications from diabetes. She must have been 70 when she could no longer see. As a family, including my grandparents, we attended Templo Gethsemani, Assemblies de Dios, (Temple Gethsemani, Assembly of God Church), and our Pastor, Rev. Cruz always gave the congregation the opportunity to participate in the service by sharing a scripture reading or selecting a hymn for everyone to sing. It was not unusual for someone to stand and share a word of testimony or witness, as we now call it. For me, that time of sharing was most times an "eye-opener". People shared a story of how and where they had felt God's presence in their life that week or they told of an encounter with a friend in need where they had the opportunity to share God's love or a word of scripture.

My grandmother, who, of course, could no longer read the Bible (they didn't have the Bible on Tape yet), would often stand up and share this memorized verse of scripture, from Romans 1: 16.

"No me avergüezo de el Evangelio, porque es potencia de Dios para todo el creyente; primero el Judío, y tambien el Gentile".

Translation: *I am not ashamed of the Gospel because it is the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes: first for the Jew; then for the Gentile.*

I can still hear her clear "sing-song" voice, sometimes full of emotion, a little saddened because she had lost her sight, but joyful in the fact that she was destined to be with God someday. I don't know if she ever realized the impact that her "sharing" had on me. I don't know if I realized at the time, that it would have an impact on my life.



FUMC FINANCE NEWS

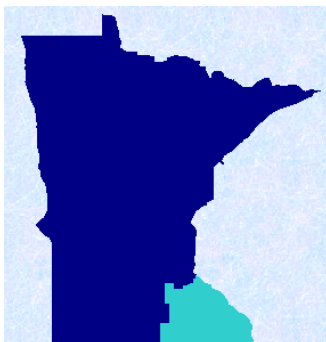

ALL-PARISH PICNIC

On Saturday, September 10th, Harry & Elaine Boland will once again be hosting an all-parish picnic at their acreage northeast of Cherry Grove. You're welcome to come as early as 3:00 PM to enjoy the woods, trails and streams (their property runs alongside of Forestville Park and a branch of the Root River runs through it as well), and we'll be eating around 6 PM. Fish, BBQ and drinks will be provided. Bring your own table service and a dish to pass!

To get to Harry & Elaine's take US 63 south of Spring Valley to County 14. Turn left on 14 and head towards Cherry Grove. Go one mile *past* the Cherry Grove turnoff and you'll see a sign for a minimum maintenance road on the north. Turn left on this road and follow the signs back to their place.

CHERRY GROVE AIR CONDITIONING PROPOSAL

With the return of hot and sticky conditions this summer (this week has been particularly miserable) a number of our members have asked if we could look into the cost of installing air conditioning to the upstairs of our building. The heat can particularly be a problem when we have services later in the day, such as Cowboy Church, or when a large group is crowded into the building such as at Cowboy Church or during a wedding or funeral. While it wasn't unusually warm during our July Cowboy Church service a handful of people did have to get up and go outside for a while to catch their breath.

While the Church Council has not yet met to discuss the possibility, the Trustees did decide to pursue bids just to see if the project would be feasible. Two options have been explored. The first would involve installing traditional compressors along the west side of the building and running the a/c through our furnace ductwork. Es-

timates for this work have begun at around \$5000. The second would entail installing two "Mini Split" air conditioners on the east wall of the Sanctuary. Preliminary conclusions are that the second option would probably not cool the entire sanctuary well.

However, we have also found a problem with the first option. All of the technicians have agreed that the fans on our current furnaces are undersized for air conditioning, and they have expressed concern that we would likely burn them out. As a result they have also given us estimates for replacing the two furnaces that heat the upstairs, adding another \$3800 or more to the cost of the project.

While that might seem to suggest that we should abandon the project entirely there is another factor to consider, and that is that our current furnaces in Cherry Grove are over 25 years old. Not only are they less efficient than newer models, we will not be able to replace certain parts when they go bad.

While the burners were replaced on two furnaces a few years ago, at some point the heat exchangers will go out and we'll be scrambling to replace one or more furnaces when we need them most.

For these reasons it might be wise for us to at least consider replacing the two upstairs furnaces, and adding air conditioning could also be an option.

One of the questions

that will certainly influence the Church Council's decision in these matters will be the availability of funding. If you would like to see us add air to the building and would be willing to make a pledge towards the project contingent upon Council approval, please contact Denny Brusse or Beth Mulhern in the office and let them know a.s.a.p.

***** IMAGINE NO MALARIA

At the 2008 General Conference our representatives adopted an initiative to combat malaria in sub Saharan Africa. First called "Nothing But Nets", the initiative has since morphed into a larger program known as "No More Malaria". In June several members from our larger parish attended a training event at the Stewartville United Methodist Church to learn more about the project. Among other things we learned that every fifteen seconds a child dies from this mosquito born plague!

Over the next three years our goal is to raise 1.8 million dollars as an Annual Conference to purchase nets, drain stagnant water sources, educate families, and provide medicines. Since an anonymous donor has already pledged \$600,000 to this cause, we need to raise only 1.2 million dollars.

None of the Councils in our Parish have had an opportunity to make plans yet for how we will be participating, but we wanted you to be aware that we'll be presenting more in the very near future.

The meeting opened with a devotional by Carol.

The May minutes were reviewed and a motion made to approve. m/s/c

Financial Report: The 05-31-11 checkbook balance was \$3,744.49. \$10,000 has been paid so far in 2011 for apportionments, leaving a balance yet to be paid of \$14,092.76. The roof loan balance is \$7,193.11 (paid through 07-28-11)

Correspondence: Darlene shared a letter from Chelsea Ramaker, who is participating in a Northwestern College mission internship to Portugal, South Africa and Mozambique. This item was tabled until the "new business" part of the meeting.

Trustees: Jeff said that the June 5th waffle breakfast was attended by about 180 people. He also reported that the lawn mowing schedule is covered for most of the season; and another workday needs to be planned, and more will be done for this in the near future.

Worship: Carol reported that the first summer concert was held 06-18-11 with Anita & Zeke Kunkle, the Gospel Musicians". Excellent music. The Worship Committee felt fortunate to have good weather although it looked a little threatening. Approximately 35 people attended.

SPRC: Deanna reported the next meeting will be Tuesday, June 28th.

Membership: Mary reported the deaths of Myrtle Carson and Henry Leutink. There was one baptism: Jenna Gloria Sterns. Total membership is 326.

Missions: Jan had nothing to report at this time.

Education: Barb reported that Vacation Bible School was held on Saturday June 11th with Cherry Grove UMC at Good Earth Village. This year there were 28 students attending, 19 from FUMC which was significantly higher than the attendance last year. Several young people joined the adult volunteers and deserve many kudos for the great job each of them did. Everyone seemed to have a good time throughout the day.

UMW: Darlene reported that the UMW met 06-08-11. Chelsi Hammon was the guest speaker. She gave a very interesting presentation on her trip to Mississippi. UMW's next meeting will be 09-14-11.

Sims Sound Maintenance Contract

Sims Sound and Video have sent us a Priority/Service Maintenance Agreement for our consideration. They offered to allow us to pay in 4 installments of \$206 per month. We discussed the coverage of this agreement at the May meeting and we determined that it is good coverage for the sound system. We were concerned, however, about the upfront money that we would have to invest. If we want to accept this contract, it can start July 1st and we can have it signed and fax to them this week.

Administrative Assistant
